I. CATHOLIC IDENTITY/ IGNATIAN SPIRITUALITY

- The continuation into a second year of the Spiritual Exercises for members of the cohort from 2015/2016 under the direction of Fr. Earl Smith, S.J.
- The addition of Emmaus House Food Bank as a partner group for our Christian Service Program. Grade 12 students volunteered at the Food Bank through parts of Terms I and II.
- The addition of a Grade 10 run ESL Conversation Lunch Program for refugee and immigrant members of RIAC (Refugee and Immigrant Advisory Council) Wednesdays at lunch to our Christian Service Program.
- The formation of a social justice committee comprised of members of the St. Bon's committee and students from Holy Heart who began planning for a Refugee Camp Simulation scheduled for Fall 2017.
 Students attended a workshop on Refugee Camp Experiences facilitated by RIAC and initiated first planning steps.
- Grade 10 students have contributed Service hours by participating in our Eco-Literacy Campaign, both through their work with composting in the school and with running eco-lessons with classes in Holland Hall.
- The continuation of our relationship with The Gathering Place, The MacMorran Centre and the Computers for Seniors as part of our Christian Service Program.
- Teacher Professional Development included experiential on-site work with The Gathering Place, St. Patrick's Mercy Home, RIAC and our Garden Program as part of teacher formation.
- Students travelled internationally to participate in workshops and conferences with students from other member schools of the Jesuit Schools Network.
- Our Director of Campus Ministry travelled to Kansas City to participate in a Campus Ministers Cohort Gathering oriented at exploring best practices for student retreats and spiritual formation.
- Fr. Earl Smith, S.J., and Fr. Cecil Critch both worked with classes in primary, elementary and junior high on "teaching masses" oriented at giving students a deeper understanding of liturgical experience. The Kindergarten class, the Grade 6 class and the Grade 8 class all participated in taking responsibilities for mass ministries at school masses.
- A liturgical committee was developed to share ideas for enhancing student mass experiences. From that, a return to a greater role for band and choir at masses has taken place.
- Fr. Joe Mroz, S.J., the Archdiocesan Chaplain at Memorial University, visited our school to speak to our Senior High students about university and faith

II. ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Curricular Activities

- Inspired by Pope Francis' Laudato Si' and in collaboration with the team
 "For A New Earth", we launched an initiative to integrate Eco-literacy
 into our curriculum through all grade levels. The work that the students
 have done on this topic will be showcased at the inaugural Eco-Literacy Day
 on June 9.
- A K-6 Art Jumpstart program was launched in January. Working with local
 artists, classroom teachers chose cross curricular based projects that reflected
 a love for our common home. Students explored art forms such as drawing,
 water colour painting, printmaking, bookmarking and silk painting. The art
 pieces will be displayed during Eco-Litearcy Day.
- L'Arche presented to our Jr. and Sr. students regarding their programs and spoke about inclusion and tolerance in our world.
- RNC Constable Ken Milks gave a presentation on CyberBullying and Internet safety to our Grade 7-12 students.
- MADD Canada presented to Grades 7-12 on Drinking and Driving Awareness
- Fight the New Drug presentation on pornography for Grades 7-12 sponsored by the Centre for Life.
- Grade 9 Information Evening for High School Programming
- Frankie's Book Challenge, which was launched during the 2015-16 school year, has expanded to include Grades 2 and 3 students
- In March we participated in Literacy Week in Holland Hall. The
 committee planned activities giving all our students the opportunity to
 celebrate the importance of literacy and the love of books. The theme was
 Seusville (Dr. Seuss books).
- The students of Holland Hall participated in two exciting music field trips – Wizard of Oz and National Arts Centre Orchestra (Alexander Shelley, conductor)

School Wide Professional Development

In addition to opportunities for staff to attend various professional development through travel to Jesuit Schools Network cohort gatherings, we held five and one-half days of school wide professional development. Days 1-3 - These days were held prior to the opening of school for students. Father William Muller, S.J., Executive Director at the Jesuit Schools Network, led sessions on Ignatian Pedadgoy and Ignatian Spiritutality with a focus on the four "C's." These four "C's" are: competence, conscience, compassion, commitment. Using a plan prepared by the President's Office, each of these characteristics where in-serviced to staff and rolled out using signs and messaging through the school. The third day included presentations from "For A New Earth." We examined Laudato Si' and the possibilities for across the curriculum infusion of eco-literacy themes.

Day 4 (1/2 day) – In October we were joined by Frances Tilly, Assistant Director, National First Spiritual Exercises Program headquartered in Sydney, Australia. Frances spent the afternoon discussing the program and spiritual conversation.

Day 5 – The staff completed work begun at staff meetings in Septemeber and October on the remaining 4C's. Rather than spend time in the afternoon trying to connect these two final C's to our personal spiritual lives and formations through exposition, we organized a series of service options for all staff that enabled them to "do" the C's individually and collectively, each in their own way. This was their personal Experience of these two C's; albeit limited, the afternoon activities hopefully gave them a 'taste' for further reflection.

Day 6 – The session included: Tom McGrath challenged staff with the question, "Where are we with the 4C's?" Annette Mallay and Jaline Rowsell examined, "How are we as educators, holistically living the 4Cs?" The afternoon session included a review by Tom McGrath of the Jesuits' General Congregation 36 and Greg O'Leary and David Martino examining the question, "What is the connection between the 4Cs and Truth and Reconciliation, Global Citizenship and Eco-Literacy." The day concluded with a First Spriritual Exercises examen led by Krista Cardwell.

- Captains of Class: We are pleased to report that our new "Captains of Class" program is beginning to come together. Captains act as a liaison between St. Bon's and alumni. Development

Highlights of the year in development include:

- The membership of the Ignatius Society has increased from 32 members in 2015-16 to 42 members in 2016-2017.
- The creation of the Xavier Society was announced at the Ignatius Society Dinner in March. The Xavier Society will operate with the same objectives as the Ignatius Society, with the money raised being used solely for Bursary Assistance. Membership is open to persons under 40 years of age and they pledge to donate \$200 per year for five years. Since the announcement, we have recruited 2 members. A committee will come together to help with the recruitment of new members.
- In November the Annual Giving Appeal was mailed to our supporters, alumni and parents with a follow-up mail out, the Easter Appeal, taking place in March. Donors to these appeals can designate their donation towards the Bursary Program, the Alumni Athletic Scholarship or Greatest Need. To date, these appeals have raised over \$25,000 which is a 39% increase over last year's efforts.


IV. FINANCE, FACILITIES & HUMAN RESOURCES

Finance


Fiscal Year 2015-2016 (AUGUST 1, 2015 – JULY 31, 2016)

The audit is complete and the Canada Revenue Agency return has been filed for the Fiscal Year ending July 31, 2016. St. Bonaventure's College ended the year with a surplus of \$92,596. Because of these revenues, we were able to increase our overall Retained Earnings from a deficit of (\$25,273) to a surplus of \$67,323.

As made evident in the included pie charts, the primary revenue source is tuition. While the remaining revenue is just 13% of the total, this adds up to \$434,744 that had to come from other means (ie: donations, fundraising, etc).



Salary is the number one expense at St. Bonaventure's College, consuming 81% of the total expenses accrued in this fiscal year. In fact, for every \$1 collected from parents for tuition fees, \$0.89 has to go towards paying staff salaries. That leaves \$0.11 to pay for operating expenses which include maintenance of our buildings, heat & electricity, miscellaneous academic and classroom supplies, etc. The majority of the major capital improvements have been funded through our generous donors and fundraising events.



Fiscal Year 2016-17 (AUGUST 1, 2016 – JULY 31, 2017)

The budget for the current year was approved in December 2015. It called for revenues of \$3,260,000 and expenses of \$3,235,060. Based on our quarterly reports and with prudent management, we are expecting to finish our year with a surplus.

Budget (AUGUST 1, 2017-JULY 31, 2018)

The Board of Governors approved the 2017-18 budget in January 2017 and an updated version was presented again in March 2017 and approval was reconfirmed. Tuition will remain the same at \$8,400 for the upcoming school year.

Facilities

We continue to complete upgrades and improvements to the school and the campus. During the past year the following work was completed:

- Holland Hall refurbished boy's & girl's washrooms, replacement of 9 panels of glass block, installed brick wall and crushed stone,
- Mullock Hall painted logo on gym floor, refurbished staircase, replaced flooring in chemistry lab, refurbished front steps, installed canopy over emergency exit, installed new staircase handrails,
- Painting and plumbing repairs in both Holland Hall & Mullock Hall,
- Installed exterior lighting,
- Installed new entrance and signage at campus entrance, and
- Replaced 9 sections of fencing.

The cost of this work was approximately \$110,000, which was be covered by the proceeds from the 2015 Fall Gala and the 2016 Lottery.

Human Resources

Staff continue to access world class professional development through the Jesuit Schools Network. This year staff members attended 18 national and international professional development conferences, meetings or student events. We had representatives present at Jesuit Schools cohort meetings for: Seminars in Ignatian Leadership (Atlanta, San Francisco, Phoenix); Mission and Identity (Kansas); Principals (Washington); Advancement / Alumni (Boston); Presidents / Board Chairs (Miami); Academic Assistant Principals (Spokane); Chaplains (Kansas); Education of Youth (Regina); Directors of Jesuit works (Pickering)

Student leadership training (teacher accompanied) and travel has included:

- Ignatian Teach-In for Justice (Washington)
- Operation Veteran (Ottawa)
- WE Day (Halifax)
- Jesuit Basketball (Montreal)

V. GOVERNANCE

The Board of Governors primary responsibility is to hold the Jesuit and Catholic mission and identity of the school in trust for the Society of Jesus by setting direction, establishing policies, and ensuring programs build and manifest the school's Jesuit and Catholic mission and identity. The Board mandate includes:

- · Striving to represent the diversity of the community,
- Selecting trustees is mission driven and their understanding of the mission is strengthened through ongoing formation in Jesuit education, Ignatian spirituality, and good governance practices,
- With the President, maintaining a vibrant relationship with the Archbishop of St. John's, the Jesuit Provincial and the Assistant for Pre-secondary and secondary education (PASE).
- Engaging in presidential succession planning in collocation with the Jesuit
 Provincial, knowing the President is mandated by the Provincial as the
 "Director of the Work,"
- Actively participating in the Jesuit Schools Network,
- Ensuring professional growth opportunities for school personnel through the Jesuit Schools Network,
- Engaging in self-evaluation

These are accomplished through:

- Board retreats, discernments and examens.
- Laser focus on mission.
- Board composition.
- Good governance practice.
- Quarterly Board meetings.
- Board Orientation sessions.
- Yearly meeting with the Provincial, PASE.
- Participation of the local Jesuit Superior in service on the Board.
- Participation in the bi-annual Board Chairs Conference with the Jesuit Schools Network (JSN).
- Annual participation by Staff in a myriad of JSN cohort gatherings.

Our fund raising plan will continue to evolve away from event based fundraising toward an annual giving campaign.

Government Relations

As promised we have opened the dialogue with government and will continue to explore with them concerns around the supply of student textbooks and teacher materials, including the accessing of government sponsored professional development opportunities for teachers.
